Monghidoro, Bolognese Apennines. A 40-year-old painter is intent on preparing for the exhibition that should launch his career when Marie Bertrand-a lawver and mother of Simone Salomoni-rents the house adjacent to his for the summer. Marie and Simone experience a strong fascination with the man, but it is mostly the teenager who opens up to him. He confesses past abuse and a present of self-harm and promiscuous sexuality. He opens wide the deep cavern of himself by allowing the painter to read his stories. The artist is thus forced to choose between the desire to care for Simone - becoming his mentor and guide and the need to regain lost sexual vigor and inspiration. "Operaprima" stems from the chaos where all forms tend to dissolve, presenting less the usual tension in the creative value of art and more a disintegration that demands a painful synthesis of physicality and verb, body and word. Salomoni tells a powerful story in which the work of art and its creator merge into an intimate and dramatic confession.

Simone Salomoni was born in Bologna in 1979. A graduate in Contemporary Italian Literature, he scripts commercials, videos and immersive virtual reality experiences. One of his installations was created and projected in the courtyard of Palazzo Foscari during Venice Art Night 2021. He teaches storytelling and narrative techniques in the Expert Mixed Reality course of FITSTIC (Fondazione ITS Tecnologie/ Industrie Creative Technologies) and is a lecturer in the Storytelling Workshop directed by Giulio Mozzi.


Bodo lives with his mother near the Lorettoberg (Freiburg, Breisgau, Germany). Bodo and Mother work in their laundrette: washing, ironing. Bodo likes ironing shirts. Pillowcases, less so. Whenever possible, before going to sleep, he looks out of the window and the breeze coming down from the Lorettoberg comforts him. Bodo falls asleep melancholy and serene. He is simple-hearted, but sometimes he has unsettling enthusiasms, kept calm pharmacologically. Bodo loves his mother. Bodo falls in love with a client. When she, with her family, returns to her country just over the nearby border in France, Bodo's love takes over all of Bodo.

Bodo is a wonderful character, created by the art of Franco Stelzer, master storyteller, a pen that does not write: it tattoos. Bodo is a gift Stelzer gives us; he is a presence that is not forgotten. The text has Central European sounds and ribbing, a soul that echoes non-Italian literature, but inlaid with a deeply Italian language as beautiful as a snow crystal. It is a tale whose precise and measured dose of enchantment makes the prose and its rhythm capable of painting such a creature, Bodo, adhering to his delicate dementia with all the complexity and intelligence of the voice that tells it. The writer demonstrates extreme confidence. His empathy for the figure he is inventing is total, with a hint of cruel harshness that affects Bodo, but more importantly, all of us, through him as an example. This love story is a powerful whisper. The absolute pain that runs through it, however, comes in only second, for it is instead a mysterious and inalienable happiness that wins, on the line.

Franco Stelzer was born in Trento where he lives now after long residences in Germany and Bologna. He was a teacher and a translator from German. With Einaudi he published Ano di volpi argentate (2000) Il nostro primo, solenne, stranissimo Natale senza di lei (2003) Cosa diremo agli angeli (2018) and for Maestrale Matematici nel sole (2009) .

Whose voice is speaking, in poetry? To whom does it speak, and to say what? In this book, monologues and common language, introversion and listening, chatter taken from the everyday (streetcars, waiting rooms, bar tables) or from social networks (the real meeting places in the 21st century), traces and resonances of classics and contemporaries (from Mann, Hamsun, Foster Wallace and Sarah Kane to Di Ruscio, Bordini and Nathalie Quintane) merge and mix.

"La distinzione" is a way of being in the world, among others, discovering oneself exposed to the same verbal exuberance and bodily fragility: the symbolic center is the hospital, where illness and its cure are the two faces of a humanity that resists the inevitability of the end, its announcement, its imminence, and asks to be told precisely in its vanishing or dispersing within the micro-stories of the indistinct ("Look at me, I disappear"). But it is not a matter of drowning in gloom: the voices of hospital zombies are, in the end, vital, unafraid to communicate the desire to nurture, to endure, to transform constraints and limitations into opportunities for closeness, sharing, sociability.

Those who have the courage to die also have the courage to laugh, reversing the famous maxim. And here, amidst flawed bodies and psychic dysfunction, crumbling memories and obsessive hypochondrias, every once in a while, indeed, and heartily, we laugh.

Gilda Policastro is a writer, literary critic and university lecturer. She has been curating poetry courses at the "Molly Bloom" Academy of Creative Writing in Rome and Milan since 2016. She has collaborated with the cultural supplements of major newspapers and edited the column "La bottega della poesia" for "la Repubblica" from 2019 to 2021. She is editor of the website "Words and Things. Literature and Reality" and contributes to the digital magazine "Snaporaz." She has published novels including "II farmaco" (Fandango, 2010), "Cella" (Marsilio, 2015), "La parte di Malvasia" (La Nave di Teseo, 2021) and books of poetry including "Non come vita" (Aragno, 2013), Inattuali (Transeuropa, 2016) and "La distinzione" (Giulio Perrone, 2023).

With elegance, delicacy and an trepidation that never becomes sentimentality, Remmert recounts existences, as minimal and negligible as ours, showing the point at which, perhaps for once in our lives, they become incandescent.

An Albanian bouncer, a Cuban girl, a Japanese hairdresser, a group of English hooligans, two Serbian dog breeders, and many others: History looms over them with all its inert weight and faceless pressure. 

His works have been translated in France, Britain, Germany, The Netherlands, Bulgaria, Israel, Russia and the United States.


When he is offered a substitute orchestral position in Bari, Vittorio, a cellist in the grip of "abstract fury," decides to leave. Margherita Giacobino's book is a fictionalised biography/autobiography of Patricia Highsmith. A lesbian in an era when to be homosexual was to be reviled and discriminated against, and made to feel guilty and ashamed, Patricia Highsmith struggled with her sexual identity in this social context, and the book fruitfully explores how this might have contributed to her creative output.

The title is a reference to Patricia Highsmith's second novel "The Price of Salt", a lesbian romance originally published under a pseudonym after it was rejected by the publisher of her first novel. It was not until 1990 that she agreed to its reissue under her own name and with the new title "Carol".

he first of our relationships is with our mothers; it begins even before we come into the world. Talking about it can be the challenge of a lifetime, because in that relationship many of the truths about ourselves are often inscribed. In this novel Margherita Giacobino centers on a relationship between two women -one older, the other younger- who throughout their existences have listened to each other, ignored each other, observed each other, loved each other deeply: incidentally they are also mother and daughter, even more incidentally they are the author and her mother. As a child Margaret contemplates her mother raptly as if she were the sun, the bright star around which everything revolves and comes to life: brave, energetic, determined. As a teenager, she does not seek or receive confidences, but communication passes in everyday gestures and words, and trust is total. As an adult, between worry and amusement, Margaret sees her mother begin a new life, weave a mysterious love.... Portrait of a Family with a Fat Daughter tells the story of four generations of a peasant family living outside Turin between the late nineteenth century and the boom years of the 1950s, as they clamber out of grinding rural poverty into the sixties world of frozen fish and fridges. The author's grandmother emigrates to California and returns to Italy semi-paralysed after a mishap as she is giving birth. When her father dies, the author's eight-year-old mother returns to Italy, to be brought up by a family she does not know, to become Italian again and ultimately to marry a captivating man-boy whose fecklessness is grippingly described, as is his time in a German prison camp in World War II. She runs a small shop which gradually expands, lifting the family out of the working class; her daughter, Margherita, always a conscientious student, reared by this extended matriarchal family, becomes the writer of this book.

Like Charlie Brown (referred to by the initials in the title) hopelessly in love with the little redhaired girl, the protagonist of this novel also suffers from sentimental inadequacy, as her preferences drive her to fall irresistibly in love with little girls like herself.

In adolescence, squeezed within the walls of a school, she cannot hide behind the sad black pinafore her attempts at shy approaches to her classmates. Everything seems to explode with the great love for a university teacher, the ideal woman, myth and femme fatale. Although kept on the edge of ambiguity, the relationship cannot last.

After the inevitable emotional disaster, life resumes by replaying encounters, experiments and wanderings, between a sleepy, colourful Rome and a remote Sardinian beach.

In the grand finale, love, death, and coming out mingle in an ironic, lucid, melancholy picture of a final farewell.

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
