Michael Hunklinger, born in 1989, is a political scientist and author. He currently researches and teaches on the topics of diversity and inequality at the University of Amsterdam and also works on various international projects that primarily deal with questions of political participation and representation of LGBTQ+ people. In addition to numerous academic publications, he regularly analyses and comments on LGBTQ+ issues in prominent media outlets including ZiB, Der Standard and the Washington Post.



As a cultural scientist, Beate Absalon works on contemporary sexual culture with a focus on consensual negotiations. Combining theory and practice with the label "luhmen d'arc", she offers workshops on sexual forms of play that focus on ambiguities, socio-political contexts and non-cathartic feelings (such as awkwardness, shyness, laziness).



In 2005, she founded a parent-child centre with a focus on empowerment, growth and weight control, breastfeeding and nutritional advice, as well as taboo topics such as sexuality and domestic violence. She has also worked in journalism for over ten years. She is co-author of the standard work "Textbook For Pregnancy, Birth, Puerperium and Work". Even after 20 years and countless births, Katharina Wallner is still touched by the special moment when new life comes into the world.



The historian **Marion Wisinger** has been dealing with Austrian remembrance culture for many years. She is concerned with coming to terms with the history forgotten by society, which she addresses in her studies on violence in Austrian children's homes, as editor-in-chief of the Liga-Magazine For Human Rights and in her articles and essays on contemporary history as well as in sensitive narrative literature. She is chairwoman of the Vienna Forum for Democracy and Human Rights and vice-president of the Austrian PEN Club. She lives in Vienna and Bad Goisern.

How many world events fit into one village? Can the personal overshadow the collective, or is it the other way round? Is a village not the sum of its individual biographies?

Historian Marion Wisinger traces the history of Bad Goisern from the turn of the century until the reconstruction. She collects the residents' personal experiences and links them to global events. 
Salt & Austria A mineral makes history Salz & Österreich

During this time, a man emerges who wants to connect the European states with one another: Georges Nagelmackers (1845–1905). 
Cushion Talk - An honest book about growing up Couchgeflüster


This autobiography was published in 1986 after his final retirement, and it was typically Niki – to the point with no frills and fancies, no doubt dictated at breakneck speed. It covers the years from his childhood to his accident and the battle for the 1976 title with the charismatic James Hunt, and then his departure from Formula 1 and motor racing as a three-times world champion and one of the most successful drivers in the sport, starting at the bottom with BRM and March, then Ferrari, before moving to the Brabham team run by Bernie Ecclestone, and finally McLaren.


Boredom Langeweile


Stupidity Dummheit


The Curator Die Kuratorin


Breathing Skin Atemhaut


Eat or die Friss oder stirb







Till the End, Marie Bis ans Ende, Marie


